Fort Lauderdale, Florida

Incorporated on March 27, 1911, the City of Fort Lauderdale is situated on the southeast coast of Florida. It is centrally located - approximately 23 miles north of Miami and 42 miles south of Palm Beach. Encompassing more than 33 square miles with a population of nearly 180,000, Fort Lauderdale is the seventh largest city in Florida.

The City of Fort Lauderdale is named for a Second Seminole War fortification built on the banks of New River in 1838. In that year, Major William Lauderdale led a detachment of Tennessee Volunteers south along the east coast of Florida to capture Seminole agricultural lands and battle Indian warriors. Three forts named after Major Lauderdale were constructed: the first at the fork of New River; the second at Tarpon Bend; and the largest on the beach at the site of Bahia Mar. None of the forts survive today.

The Best of Both Worlds

Through the cooperative efforts of residents, businesses and local government, Fort Lauderdale has evolved into a City that offers the best of both worlds - an attractive business environment and an outstanding quality of life.

An advantageous economic climate is helping the City of Fort Lauderdale establish itself as a world-class international business center. Once known strictly as a tourism-based economy, Fort Lauderdale now supports a diverse range of industries, including marine, manufacturing, finance, insurance, real estate, high technology, avionics/aerospace, film and television production.

Port Everglades, the major deep-water seaport, handles general cargo and petroleum products. The cruise terminal caters to numerous luxury liners, serving as a viable alternative to the massive Caribbean cruise industry in Miami.

Fort Lauderdale also offers an outstanding quality of life, highlighted by a semi-tropical climate, rich natural beauty and array of cultural, entertainment and educational amenities. Shore Excursions

Settlement of Accounts

Guests settling accounts with a credit card that was validated at embarkation: Are not required to contact the Guest Relations Desk, as charges have been billed automatically to your credit card company.

Guests who pay by cash or travelers checks:

Will receive a note in their stateroom requesting them to settle their account at the Guest Relations Desk, Deck 3, the day prior to disembarkation by 10:30pm. Please note that you may continue using your SeaPass™ Card during late evening hours, and settle your account again by cash and travelers checks (both only in U.S. Dollars) on the morning of disembarkation from 6:00am–8:30am. Due to end of cruise accounting procedures, all accounts must be closed by 8:30am the morning of your debarkation. Should you have any inquiries after you have settled your account, please ensure to contact the Guest Relations Desk no later than 8:30am the morning of your debarkation. After this time we are not able to make any changes in your account.

Immigration Inspection

The Immigration Inspection for all U.S. and Non-U.S. Citizens will take place in the Terminal Building as you disembark the vessel in Fort Lauderdale.

When attending the Immigration Inspection please ensure you have your passport and proof of citizenship readily available. Green Card Holders should carry their Alien Registration Cards (ARC) with them.

Please also ensure that you have completed and signed your Customs Declaration Form before disembarking the ship, as it will be checked and stamped by the Immigration Authorities in the terminal.

Any payments due can be made outside in the terminal after the start of disembarkation.

U.S. Customs Allowances

Please note the following U.S. Customs allowances:

U.S. Residents

• Purchases up to \$800 per person, including purchases made on the ship and in foreign ports of call (for a combined total of \$800 per person can be taken back duty free into the United States of America.)

• A limit of 1 carton of 200 cigarettes – you must be 18 years or older. Excess U.S. Cigarettes market with "U.S. tax-exempt for use outside U.S." or "Made for Export Only." will be seized. Foreign manufactured tobacco products will be subject to duty and internal revenue taxes.

• A limit of 100 cigars (No Cuban cigars allowed). Must be 18 years of age or older.

• 1 liter of alcohol is duty-free, including purchases made on the ship. You must be 21 years or older to take alcohol back to the United States of America. Applicable Internal Revenue taxes and duties will be assessed on alcohol overages.

Non-U.S. Residents:

Staying longer than 72 hours in the U.S.:

\$100 duty-free value, one quart of liquor per person over 21, and one carton cigarettes.

If you have exceeded your allowance, you are required to pay the appropriate duty to Customs Officials.

Please note the following information if you are returning home to:

Canadian Citizens:

\$750 duty-free value, 1.15 liters of alcohol and 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars. The \$750 limitation includes purchase price of alcoholic beverages, cigars and cigarettes. Canadian Customs allowances are not combinable as in the U.S.

U.K. Citizens:

£145 duty-free value, 1 liter of alcohol and 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars. The £145 limit includes purchase price of alcoholic beverages, cigars and cigarettes. British Customs allowances are not combinable as in the U.S.
